

"Hello, my name is Paris. I am 17 years old and I have a little girl called Rosina who is 19 months old. We live in the move-on flats connected to St Paul's Lodge, GFS's shared housing scheme in Great Yarmouth. During my time here I have had many ups and downs; however, with the encouragement from staff members, they have helped me overcome everything. When I first moved to St Paul's Lodge, I'm not going to lie, I was so scared and nervous due to just breaking up with my daughter's dad, all my confidence just went. The staff were so supportive, they helped me

get my life back on track, get my confidence back and become the parent I am now. They praise you when they're proud of you and think you have done something very good, but they also tell you if they don't agree on something you're doing and guide you and give you tips. Now, thanks to them, I have moved out of the Lodge and am now currently waiting to move into my own place with Rosina. I have also just done a speech for Family Nurse Partnership which I couldn't have ever even thought of doing before."

Our work aims to promote personal and spiritual development, reduce risk and remove barriers, encourage formal and informal education, empower informed choices, tackle social exclusion, inspire change through ownership and participation, and challenge negative stereotypes.

Exploring

Young women feel empowered to explore issues they care about, in a supportive single gender environment, and in their wider lives.

Linda Hanford has been a volunteer at GFS nursery and St Paul's Lodge for over 21 years. She is a warm, dependable, approachable lady who always has time for others without over-stepping professional or personal boundaries. Linda is loved by the young children and is highly respected by staff and young women. Our young women often find it easier to talk to Linda about problems or use her as a sounding board for thoughts and ideas, before speaking with paid staff.

"My name is Sharn and I am 20 years old.
Coming to the Domestic abuse Awareness
for Youth (DAY) programme has helped
me understand what is right and wrong
in a relationship. I actually started on
the programme because I wanted to
understand more about myself as I felt as
though I was controlling and abusive to my
partner. I have learned so much about the
tactics used in controlling relationships and
realised that I have been guilty of manipulation
and controlling behaviour. Through attending
the programme and talking to my partner
we decided to work at our relationship

at a time when we were ready to give up. Through reading the book given to me on the programme, we became aware that we were both guilty of forms of abuse, for example bullying each other to get our own way and checking each other's phones. We were also giving mixed messages in our parenting which we didn't realise we were doing.

We are now better parents and better people. In reflection I can see how former relationships were abusive and how I normalised and minimised it. I will never allow this to happen again and can't thank GFS enough for the support given to get where I am today."

By accessing the Skegness project's youth café, isolated young women have been able to develop positive interests, receive adult guidance and gain support from their peers.

Lorraine is 19 and started coming to the Butterfly Effect when she was 16. The project has given her confidence and people to talk to. She has made friends and learned to speak up for herself. She recently took part in a consultation with the Norfolk Youth Advisory Board where she was able to do a presentation in front of people she had never met. Lorraine has also just started to go to GFS's Youth Work Committee meetings in London and she would like to become a volunteer for GFS in the future.

Participating

Young women are more able to think creatively to solve their own problems.

Girls and young women across GFS are real innovators, active in promoting their services and fundraising for activities. Layton St Mark branch held its annual open evening for parents and friends in July. A very successful night, it was the perfect opportunity for parents to see at first hand the types of activities the girls and young women do on Friday evenings. While the older girls served refreshments and helped run the bring-and-buy stall,

the other young women displayed all the crafts and written work they had done over the winter months, which were presented at their annual Diocesan festival.

St Laurence Pittington branch took part in the autumn show at their village hall, and produced amazing crafts and paintings. Several girls also helped out by organising craft activities for younger children, as well as running the tuck shop. "I've been coming to the Butterfly Effect for 18 months. I got details of the Benjamin Foundation's 'BOOM!' fund – I thought it would be a great opportunity to visit the Chinese State Circus which was being promoted as a local one-off performance.

Sadly this year, GFS had to take the decision to close our south London Penge project, and our nursery in Great Yarmouth. We were sad to say goodbye to all the young women, children, staff and volunteers we had worked with in these areas, but we are grateful for their commitment and dedication to GFS over the years.

As a charity, GFS depends on income from donors – large and small. In these difficult financial times, your support could help us to sustain our current work, and even develop new services across England and Wales:

- £100 buys new mattresses for a young mother living at St Paul's Lodge.
- £2,000 a year would enable us to open and run a new voluntary branch in an area of high deprivation, where there is no youth provision.
- £5,000 would enable girls and young women to set up a focus group to look at the risks and impact of social media on young people.

In addition to funding, GFS relies on the hard work and commitment of our volunteers. **We need volunteers** who want to work directly with girls and young women, as well as volunteers with skills in areas such as fundraising, marketing, IT and social media.
